GREEN JOBS TRAINING: WEATHERIZATION TECHNICIANS

True to his word, the stimulus package includes billions of dollars available in federal funding for infrastructure and renewable energy construction that will jump start our new green economy. To do this, we need people trained and qualified to build our future—Summit students will be prepared.



Building A Smart House

Driving by Summit during school hours, you are almost assured to see carpentry students working together to build a home as part of their hands-on learning experience. At the end of their training, the home is torn down until a new group of students arrive to build it

again. This is the ebb and flow of Summit.

This summer, the carpentry curriculum has changed a bit. With the help of experienced green builders, electricians and solar panel experts, Sum-

mit students are also building a residential showpiece of energy efficiency, green products and weatherization applications. Their work will continue to stand as a training model for future students as well as a learning resource for the community.

Summit will host tours for community members and any other interested parties to walk through our "Smart House," to see how the solar panels on the roof power elements within the house, what proper insulation and weatherization techniques look like, and other various green construction and carpentry techniques.

We invite you to stop by to admire their work and learn more about energy efficiency and renewable energy methods that are critical to creating a renewable future for Minnesota.

Developing curriculum to meet the ever-changing demands of the workplace is critical to our mission. Our students, and partners, count on our programs to graduate skilled workers ready to do today's work. With 40 million dollars of the stimulus package earmarked to weatherize low-income housing, there is a huge demand for certified weatherization technicians.

Summit is proud to offer the state's premier Weatherization Technician Training Program to meet this demand. Our 40-hour training program, which includes energy efficiency diagnostics; bypass sealing; insulation of foundations, floors, walls and attic; and window retrofitting/replacement was created by Summit and some of the nation's top subject experts including Conservation Service Group, Center for Energy and Environment, and Community Action of Minneapolis.

It isn't only Summit carpentry students who are taking advantage of our cuttingedge programming. It is open to all carpenters and contractors looking to be certified. As a training resource to the community at large, Summit not only becomes a training facility for new green jobs but it helps connect contracting companies with Summit and helps them to better understand how to use us as a resource to diversify their crew by hiring from our pool of top-trained minority graduates.

Summit is proud to have graduated more then 40 certified Weatherization Technicians already. Following the words of Van Jones, "Let us connect the people who most need work with the work that most needs to be done."

Forward: Through the Storm

Dear Friends.

To say that the last fiscal year was exciting and challenging is more than an understatement. When we began the year last July, the African American unemployment rate in Minneapolis was 14% and the poverty rates for people of color ranged from 25% to 45%. This was before the state unemployment rate exceeded 8% in the last report.

At Summit we proceeded to leverage our positions on the Twins stadium and the Gopher stadium to put nearly 40 people to work. We felt that long term the ultimate solution to poverty is work and income rather than crime, social services, and welfare. By September those aspirations began to fade. With the 40% drop in portfolios caused by the housing meltdown and the crash of wall street we began to witness a steady implosion of philanthropic giving. Donors who had been with us for years were suddenly fighting to preserve their own businesses and personal interests. It is at this



point that the value of our board and students began to really demonstrate the strength of the organization.

First, in October 2008 the Conley Family Foundation invested \$100,000 for us to develop a weatherization training program. By March we had launched it. Recently, we graduated our first class of new workers and we have completed two cycles for incumbent workers. Once the contracts are let with the local weatherization agencies, we have people ready to help them increase their workload tenfold. In addition, we were recently awarded \$400,000 in Federal funds (thanks to Congressman Ellison) and \$75,000 in stimulus funds, through the City of Minneapolis, for weatherization training. Our focus on construction that followed the 2003 recession led us to being positioned to take advantage of these opportunities. The board's commitment to focus and leadership were direct factors in this success.

Equally important in our positioning is the strong enrollment growth that we have enjoyed since focusing our efforts on construction and healthcare. Seven years ago we enrolled around 253 students. Today that has almost doubled to 452. In addition, financial aid performance has grown from \$205,000 to \$1,169,000 and at the end of the fiscal year 135 students were still enrolled, 165 had graduated and 120 were placed in jobs averaging \$14.00 per hour. The construction workers are earning \$15.62, down from \$17.05 in the previous period. But, we are continuing to expand our placement efforts. Our most notable addition was the participation of 18 graduates on the installation of a green roof on the Target Center. We are now building a partnership with Stock Roofing that will provide even greater opportunities for our graduates as we face the emerging green economy.

Our friends also found room in their hearts to contribute even though they were experiencing losses and uncertainty. We raised *\$1 million from foundations, events and individuals, and, most impressively, \$15,000 from raffling off a Vikings suite at \$25.00* a ticket. Our annual golf tournament was capped off by our Summer Party at the home of Jacques Gibbs, where he and his band performed while guests enjoyed the lake front view and participated in the silent and live auctions led by Karen Sorbo. The signature item that evening was the funding of a new sign with a high-tech marquis for Summit's street presence.

Finally, we had to make some tough decisions. In keeping with our attempt to focus on core business, we spun off the Quantum Opportunities Program. It will now become its own non-profit, "Seeds of Change." We simply could not devote the leadership to the program that the kids deserve. They will do well. The leadership under Mary Fitzpatrick is superb. I encourage those of you who were with us for the kids to keep them in mind. They do great things.

And, once again, keep us in your prayers and remember that "the best social service program in the world is a job!"

Connections: This Year's Graduation Statistics

- 13 Connections students are at graduation age.
- Seven are moving into a transitional special education program called Transition Plus.
- Six have graduated and received their diplomas.
- Four of the six graduates (67%) are going on to some type of postsecondary institution. This is the highest percentage of youth going on to post secondary institutions since the beginning of Connections.
- Two of the 13 will be legally emancipated from foster care.

What's New

Energy Programs Bill

Great news—the energy programs bill was signed into law in May by Governor Tim Pawlenty including \$2.5 million for green jobs training for low-income people and outreach programs. Below are some highlights of the bill.

• \$200 million in federal stimulus funding to weatherize low-income homes and public buildings and to invest in other renewable energy and energy efficiency programs. Specifically, the bill includes:

- \$1 million to train low-income people for weatherization jobs.

- \$1 million for training low-income people in renewable energy and energy-efficiency trades.

- \$500,000 for community-based nonprofit organizations to conduct outreach about renewable energy and energy-efficiency opportunities.

- Reporting mechanisms, which will require demonstration of how these weatherization programs have benefited low-income and communities of color.

- The bill is also a big win for the environment. It allocates 13 times more funding to state weatherization programs than they typically receive in a year.

• Progress toward training and hiring low-income people and people of color will be frequently reported on to the community.
